The Task Force was established by <u>Executive Order</u> <u>13045</u> in 1997.

Children breathe more air, drink more fluids, and eat more food in proportion to their body weight.



Young children crawl and explore their environment through hand-to-mouth contact.



Children's neurological, digestive and other body systems are undergoing rapid development.

Identify priority children's environmental health and safety issues best addressed through federal interagency efforts Develop federal interagency strategies to protect children's environmental health and safety

> Communicate information to federal, state, and local decision makers to protect children from environmental health risks
